



History of my 1951 Land Rover Series 1 80 inch

My Land Rover was manufactured in Birmingham England in 1951 L-R C.K.D R.H.D chassis number 16662096. Shipped to Australia to be built by Annand and Thompson at Newstead Brisbane, who were the sole distributors for Queensland and Northern Rivers of NSW.

My uncle purchased the Land Rover mid 1951 after the farm horse they had died. This was the only vehicle the family ever owned up until 1951. This vehicle was only used for farm work and taking their produce to the markets at Rocklea. They were inspired to purchase the Land Rover by their neighbour who at that stage owned a 1949 Land Rover. This vehicle is still at the neighbour's farm but has not worked since 1980's.

I have been fortunate to be handed the Land Rover to restore it and keep this part of the family history alive.

Rover 75 Air Bags

Ian Blackwood has done some research on the airbags fitted to the 75 -

"Is my Rover 75 airbag affected by the Takata airbag recall ?"

For those wondering if the airbags in their Rovers are subject to a recall but will never be contacted by the manufacturer, you can sleep well at night.

Rover 75 and MG ZT were fitted with Airbags International branded (early year) or Autoliv branded (later year) airbags so are not affected by the recall of Takata airbags.

Airbags International is a division of Autoliv. The only recall listed on Autoliv's website was for production between June and November 2016 causing failure to deploy.

This was despite the then owners BMW being greatly affected by Takata airbags including the highly dangerous "alpha" design ones. It is worth noting that Honda and Takata already knew of the dangers in 2000, so maybe Rover still had friends at Honda and steered clear of Takata (or they just needed euro content levels) !

"What about the airbag light on the dash ?"

Well I can't do an accurate long distance diagnosis, but it a quite common cause of this is the sensor that detects if the seat is occupied is faulty. This is a pad built into the seat that detects if you have a passenger (a driver is sort of assumed !) so the passenger airbag is **only** deployed if the seat is occupied. This reduces repair costs cause by unneeded deployments.

Now you are probably thinking - "why didn't they just use the seat belt sensor ?". Unfortunately in some countries you cannot assume people will wear a seat belt, vote, think before tweeting or drive on the correct side of the road, so they must be protected solely by airbags.

Fortunately, if the occupancy sensor is detected as faulty and that is the cause of the light - then normal design is "fail safe" so the airbag will **always** go off in a crash that is big enough to trigger deployment. In older cars, a crash big enough to trigger the airbags will always be a write-off in any case so one extra airbag won't make any difference.

In my own car, I have modified the junction box the occupancy pad plugs into so the seat always appears occupied. Using correct software you can set the same thing in the car computer. Both these allow the light to be reset, keep you safe, but still have the light come on for other faults.

As I said at the beginning - ***this is only one possible cause of the airbag light being illuminated.*** You are responsible for getting it checked and ensure your vehicle is safe.




